Our state-licensed STARS 4 program serves students 6 months to 12 years old with infant, toddler, pre-school, Pre-K Counts classrooms, and before/after school care.

AmeriCorps Seniors members 55+ provide one-on-one tutoring, mentorship, and supportive services.





ADULT EDUCATION

The Education and Training Center offers FREE classes in Pottstown & and Norristown to help adult learners improve basic academic skills, earn a high school diploma, learn English As A Second Language, and improve digital literacy skills, career planning, and job readiness.

DIGNITY KITCHEN

Dignity Kitchen is a multifaceted social enterprise, combining a café, workforce development, and licensed food service. It provides nutritious meals to early education centers, aids in hunger relief through home-delivered meals, conducts nutrition education and demonstrations, and offers catering to the public.

ERUC PROGRAM

The ERUC program helps eligible renters facing housing & economic insecurity with rent and utility payments to avoid eviction or loss of utility service.

ISSUE ADVOCACY

Mission-based advocacy drives awareness, issue education, and social capital-building for women's empowerment, racial justice, and equity. Locally, this includes a community-driven focus on safe, healthy communities, fair school funding and racial equity. At the national level, YW3CA aligns with YWCA USA's legislative advocacy agenda and priority issues that propel transformative change.

864 FAMILIES

in Montgomery County, providing crucial rent and utility assistance to prevent evictions and homelessness. Of those served, 84% were women-led households, and 67% were families with children, highlighting the program's focus on supporting the most vulnerable groups in the community.

130 YOUTH

gained science, math, engineering, technology, and literacy skills in YEP's STEAM enrichment programs.





300 + FAMILIES

served at our weekly Family Food Pantry located at 301 King Street which distributed 100,450 pounds of food to the community, addressing food insecurity and providing essential nutrition to those in need.

85+ CHILDREN

mentored by Foster Grandparents, 95% showed gains in school readiness or improved academic performance, demonstrating the program's effectiveness in enhancing educational outcomes.

YWCA Tri-County Area secures \$500,000 in additional federal capital investment funds for the Complex located at 724 N. Adams Street Pottstown, PA.

"This funding reinforces our commitment to serving communities and advances our vision to enhance and expand health and wellness offerings in the Tri-County Area," stated Elise Chesson, Chief Advancement Officer.

"Our budget reflects our values — so it is especially meaningful when we can secure federal investments that directly improve our communities and the resources we can offer," Dean said in a March 13 statement. "I'm always inspired by the organizations in our district who are on the ground, meeting the needs of our neighbors with innovation and compassion. They are deeply deserving of this federal funding, and I look forward to our continued partnerships."

The Complex provides modern fitness and education facilities, fostering community connections and partnerships that promote shared empowerment and growth.

Features include a range of amenities, gyms, studios, two pools, climbing facilities, a playground, classrooms, a conference room, offices, and event spaces. Community-aligned tenants include the Greater Philadelphia YMCA, Tower Health Pottstown Hospital Physical & Speech Therapy, Henley Elite Athlete Training (H.E.A.T), Mosaic Community Land Trust, and Greater Pottstown Tennis and Learning, among others.

HIGHLIGHTS CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT

We are thrilled to share the latest progress on capital improvements at our King St campus and the Recreational Complex! These enhancements are set to benefit our community programs and facilities significantly

EXPANDED OUTDOOR SPACE

The formerly blighted lot adjacent to the Early Education Center has been transformed into a beautiful enclosed green space. This area now offers ample room for outdoor play and exploration, benefiting early education, before and after school, and youth empowerment programs.



The repainting of the King St parking lot ensures a safer and more accessible space for visitors to our King St campus. These improvements enhance the overall experience for everyone utilizing our facilities.

SOUTH POOL RESTORATION

The previously inoperable N. Adams St South Pool at the Integrated Health & Wellness Complex is under reconstruction. Once completed, this pool will offer members and the community free and reduced programming for health and wellness, recreation, leisure, and water safety. The restoration includes critical upgrades to HVAC, filtration systems, pool liner, structure, and decking.

HIGHLIGHTS CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT



UPGRADED OFFICE SPACES

The renovation of Trauma Prevention Services' offices features restored hardwood floors, fresh paint, and new offices. These facilities are now better equipped to deliver programs and community support. This inviting environment will enhance our ability to provide critical services to those in need. The administrative offices on King Street now include modernized office spaces and a community conference room. These upgrades create a more functional and welcoming environment for staff and the community. The improved facilities will support better program delivery and foster stronger community connections

KITCHENS & FOOD STORAGE

The King St facility now boasts an expanded commercial kitchen with enhanced food storage capabilities. This upgrade enables us to provide more nutritious meals to early education centers, the MCIU, and other partners seeking meals and supports our hunger relief efforts, including weekly pantry distributions. The King St facilities, formerly part of the church, now serve as a community hub, and are currently being renovated. This space will feature a future demonstration kitchen and host programs and events for community members and partners.



SUPPORT AND REVENUE


